THE 2018 FIFDH ANNOUNCES THE WINNERS OF A HISTORIC EDITION

Audiences have gathered in Geneva in large numbers to meet the artists, filmmakers, activists and political figures attending the 16th edition of the International Film Festival and Forum on Human Rights, which stands as an unmissable international event.

In this 70th anniversary year of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the FIFDH was inaugurated by the president of the Swiss Confederation **Alain Berset** and the United Nations High Commissioner of Human Rights **Zeid Ra'ad Al Hussein**. Then, during 10 days and until tomorrow, the Festival offered the public 62 films, 19 international debates, 63 special events as well as 19 exhibits, all across 57 locations throughout the Greater Geneva and French-speaking Switzerland.

A new kind of international forum for discussion

The FIFDH stands in 2018 as a new kind of dialogue space on human rights; an open, constructive and independent forum allowing for many voices to be heard. As such, the evening focused on Venezuela was a historic moment: **Luisa Ortega Diaz** and **Lilian Tintori** called together, from the stage of the Festival, for a national reconciliation among all Venezuelans. Present at the FIFDH and the UN, **Gael García Bernal**, standing next to Mexican activists, human rights advocates and journalists, called out to the UN Human Rights Council and launched a campaign against impunity in Mexico, which received this week a mass international response: *No más impunidad*. With the world premiere of her film *Libye – Anatomie d'un crime*, **Cécile Allegra** shed the full light of day on the systematic rapes committed on women and men in Libyan prisons. On this occasion, a Libyan advocate showed his face and spoke up for the first time. The screening of the film *The Silence of Others* by **Almudena Carracedo** and **Robert Bahar** revealed the fight to end impunity for the authors of crimes in Franco's regime in Spain, during a memorable debate in the presence of victims.

The FIFDH also welcomed LGBTIQ+ activists **Pidgeon Pagonis** and **Hanne Gaby Odiele** for a debate on people with intersex traits, as well as feminist activist **Caroline de Haas** for a discussion on domestic violence and sexism around the film *A Better Man* by **Attiya Khan** and **Lawrence Jackman**, political figure **Benoît Hamon**, attending to discuss the unconditional basic income, and writer and essayist **Evgeny Morozov** to talk about democracy in the era of big data and social media.

New formats

This edition of the Festival was marked by an exploration of new formats. Cartoon art, with an artist residence, an exhibit and a meeting with comic artist **Guy Delisle**, honored at this year's edition. Theater, with a reading of the work of **Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie** *Dear Ijeawele, or a Feminist Manifesto in Fifteen Suggestions* by fifteen women, including the author herself, in each of their native languages. Literature, with Egyptian author **Omar Robert Hamilton**, present in Geneva for the release of his latest book *The City Always Wins*, in partnership with the FIFDH. The Festival also opened up to stand-up, virtual reality, and offered a number of screenings for young audiences.

Swiss cinema in the spotlight

The FIFDH presented a high-caliber international cinematographic selection, and films in World, International, and European premieres. Among this selection, Swiss cinema was in the spotlight, both in the fiction and documentary sections. On the occasion of the screening of *Free Men* by **Anne Frédérique Widmann**, the protagonist of the film Kenneth Reams issued a passionate cry for help by telephone from the cell where he has been imprisoned for 24 years in solitary confinement. With *À l'école des Philosophes*, **Fernand Melgar** explains that the deepest handicaps can be overcome in a favorable environment. The Rohingya tragedy was at the center of a discussion with director **Barbet Schroeder**, attending with his film *The Venerable W*. The film *Fortuna*, by **Germain Roaux**, recently awarded in Berlin, had its Swiss premiere at the opening of the Festival. The FIFDH also presented, in the presence of their respective directors, *I am Truly a Drop of Sun on Earth* by **Elene Naveriani** as well as the documentary *Willkommen in der Schweiz* by **Sabine Gisiger**.

Breaking the walls: screenings in 57 locations throughout French-speaking Switzerland

The Festival wasn't restricted to cinema venues solely. Museums, schools, theaters, restaurants, homes for migrants, psychiatric clinics and prison institutions in the Greater Geneva Area and French-speaking Switzerland welcomed screenings and events. Notably, screening programs and juries were organized in custodial facilities of the Canton of Geneva, at la Brenaz, Champ-Dollon and la Clairière – moments unanimously qualified as liberating, both for words and emotions.

The Festival continues on Sunday, with Ai Weiwei, Filippo Grandi and Carles Puigdemont

The Festival continues this Sunday March 18th with the exceptional presence of Chinese artist **Ai Weiwei**, who gives a face to thousands of refugees in 28 countries with his film *Human Flow*. The screening will be followed by a discussion with **Filippo Grandi**, the UN High Commissioner for Refugees. A screening of **Fernand Melgar's** film, reserved to children and accompanying adults, will allow for an encounter with the director as well as the writer, synesthete and poet **Daniel Tam-met**, who suffers from Asperger's syndrome and is considered one of "100 living geniuses."

Curtains with a debate around the theme of self-determination, with separatist leader **Carles Puigdemont**, Spanish legitimist journalist **Xavier Vidal Folch**, as well as **Micheline Calmy-Rey**, former president of the Swiss Confederation, and **Nicolas Levrat**, professor at the Global Studies Institute of the University of Geneva.
